### Football

Leete's JV griders remain in a hot battle for their league title despite a 17-0 loss to Fayette House. The loss dropped Leete to a 2-1 record and boosted Fayette to a perfect 3-0. Poplar, which has yet to play either Fayette or Leete, sports a 2-2 record.

The Leete squad opened the season by tearing Bedford 49-0 and then followed with a similar score over Lyncola. Leete achieved three for -10 in each game, hitting redwaters Paul Huns and Hank Smith with one apiece.

The 17-0 loss was much stiffer than the score indicated. Leete had 6 first downs compared to 3 for Fayette, but had 2 TD's called back on penalties. The Leeters were plagued all night by interceptions and blatantly bad refereeing.

### Baseball

Leete's 'Eric-A-Brace' Bowling team snagged 6 of a possible 8 points from Atlanta 38-38. Mike Dare with a 505 series and Captain Ken Backenbrack with a 491 paced the Eric-A-Brace, in the opening week of the season.

In addition to veterans Dare and Backenbrack, the team also included non-lettering Bruce Kretschel, transfer recruit Rich Wallley, and freshman Young Schuta. Wallley fired an impressive 483, while Kretschel cracked in with a 399 and Schuta posted a 405.

Dare had games of 189-179-137 for the week's high series. Backenbrack had the high game with a 192.

Leete's Bowling Bowlers crushed Lebanon Tuesday night, 8-0. Captain Backenbrack lead the team with a 508 series, with Irsh Schuta close behind with a 405. Veteran Dare, after a slow start finished with a 471 series. Kretschel rolled a 395 series, and limping Wallley posted a 424. The crushing victory put Leete into 2nd place with a record of 1-0-2 below Lancaster, who Leete loses against next Tuesday, and is undefeated. It would be quite a match!
